Demography, Community Profile & Vulnerable Groups

Our residents

Highlight: The 2021 Census revealed that 101,942 people usually reside in Port Phillip, this is an increase of 1% since 2016 (100,863). The largest age cohort living in the City of Port Phillip is 25 – 45 year olds although the proportion of residents in this age group declined in 2021 (41%, down from 44% in 2016). Weekly median individual and family incomes increased significantly over 2016 figures (up 19% and 20% respectively).

The top languages spoken at home (other than English) remain: Greek, Mandarin, Spanish, Italian and Russian (as per 2016) and the Indigenous population increased from 393 to 514 people. The proportion providing unpaid assistance to a person living with a disability increased from 8.7% to 12% however the proportion formally volunteering in the past 12 months declined (from 20% in 2016 to 16.5% in 2021)

- The largest age cohort living in the City of Port Phillip is 25 45 year olds (41%, down from 44% in 2016).
- There is a smaller number (15%) of babies, pre-schoolers and school aged children 0-19 year olds, as well as retirees and older persons 65+ (13%) as seen in the table below (figure 2) (both similar population to 2016 at 14.6% and 11.5% respectively).

- Median individual weekly income is \$1,289 and family income is \$3,052 (up from \$1,087 and \$2,559 respectively in 2016)
- The top five languages spoken at home (other than English) remain: Greek, Mandarin, Spanish, Italian and Russian (as per 2016)
- The largest non-English country of birth is India 2.1% or 2,131 people (similarly to 2016)
- Indigenous people 514 (0.5%), up from 393 people in 2016
- 56% define themselves as Atheists and 35% as Christians (42% were 'no religion' in 2016)
- 3.9% define themselves as living with a disability and 12% have provided unpaid assistance to a person with a disability (vs 8.7% in 2016)
- 16.5% have volunteered in the past 12 months (vs 20% in 2016)

Dwellings and households

Highlight: the proportion of lone households continues to grow (up from 39.5% to 43.8%) as does the proportion of flats or apartments (up from 65.8% to 66.6%)

- 51% of all dwellings are rented (down from 54% in 2016), 5% via a housing authority or community housing provider (similarly to 2016)
- 43.8% of households are lone households (up from 39.5% in 2016)
- 23.4% of dwellings are semi-detached, row or terrace house of townhouses (23.9% in 2016)
- 66.6% of dwellings are flats or apartments (65.8% in 2016)
- Average number of people per household is 2 (similar to 2016)


Families

Older persons


• In the Port Phillip council 5,540 people are in receipt of the Age Pension and 3,072 people are in receipt of the Disability Support Pension.

Demographics




Our 2021 population count was 101,942 people. This is a 1% increase on the 2016 count of 100,877 — significantly less than the 10% growth we expected and incorporate into our forecasts.

Our population has shown a slight age shift with slightly fewer residents aged 20 to 34 years and a corresponding slight increase in those aged 45 years and over.



The number of residents identifying is indigenous was 514 (0.5%) in 2021, up from 393 people in 2016. The proportion born in Australia remained stable at 65% (35% born elsewhere) as did the proportion speaking English only at home (77%). However the proportion of our residents who are Australian citizens increased (from 73% to 78%) as did the proportion claiming 'no religion' (50% up from 42% in 2016). The top five languages spoken at home (other than English) remain Greek, Mandarin, Spanish, Italian and Russian.

Households



In 2021, dwelling structure types remained stable with two thirds of all dwellings being flats or apartments.

51% of all dwellings are rented (down from 54% in 2016), 5% via a housing authority or community housing provider (similarly to 2016).

43.8% of households are lone households (up from 39.5% in 2016)
